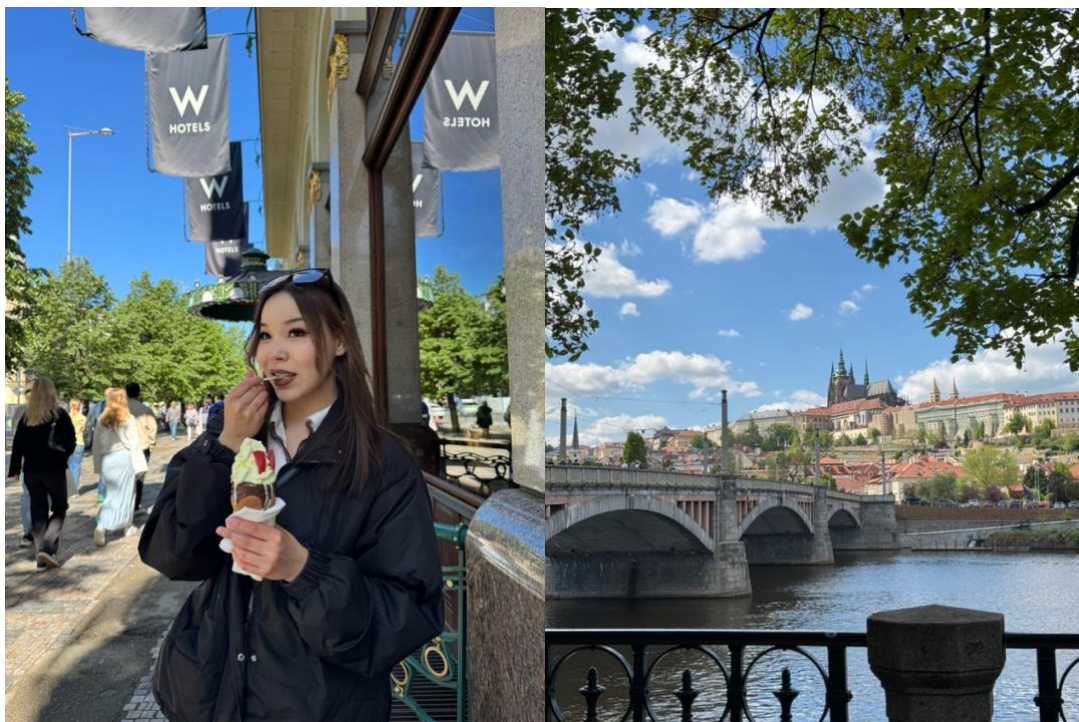




I also explored Prague in the Czech Republic and Barcelona in Spain-two cities with completely different atmospheres but equally unforgettable.
